IMPORTANT RECYCLING INITIATIVES AT HERNEWOOD

JACKSON GALLANT SCHOOL-WIDE COLLECTION OF RECYCLABLES

During his three years at Hernewood, Jackson has gathered an impressive approximate total of 35,000 recyclables. Most of these were collected from the school itself, but others were donated by community members who were inspired by his commitment to the cause.





The money earned has been used for student programs and events, giving the weight room a facelift, and of course some well-deserved treats for the students involved in recycling.



GRADE 8 STUDENTS RECYCLING PAPER AROUND THE SCHOOL

During their seventh-grade year, a group of students recognized the need to divert recyclable paper from the landfill. They began visiting each classroom and office twice a week to gather the paper. Their efforts paid off, as they collected 25 bags of paper in just one month. Since then, they have consistently collected the same amount each month.

NEW INITIATIVES COMING TO HERNEWOOD

FOOD CONTAINER RECYCLING

Our healthy lunch program has been a great success, with many students and staff members participating daily. However, we have noticed that all of the recyclable containers used for the program are being thrown in the garbage, adding up to several dozens per week. We believe that we can do better and are currently working on a plan to recycle these containers and prevent them from ending up in landfills.







For the past several years we have been busy revitalizing the greenhouse and planting outdoor vegetable and flower gardens. We have also been planting fruit and other trees. We want to start a school-wide composting program to feed our plants. Our greenhouse operates from September through to June and our outdoor gardens are quite busy from the spring until the fall. Much of what we harvest goes in to the cooking portion of our Healthy Living classes. It would make sense to make our own rich soil via school produced compost.
